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Harry B. Hartman An American Master


MARIETTA, PENN. — For many years we pursued Harry B. Hartman, who died suddenly on January 3 at 84, for an interview. For years he demurred. His refusal seemed reasonable, mostly. Though never short of words, the Marietta antiques dealer was a man of deeds, his legacy a distinctive approach to collecting Americana and an equally colorful way of putting it all together in livable interiors. Writing about the collections of two of Hartman's best clients, Leslie A. Miller and Richard Worley, in *The Magazine Antiques* in 2010, Philadelphia Museum of Art curator Alexandra Alevizatos Kirtley dubbed Hartman's approach the "Pennsylvania Style." Antiques dealer John C. Newcomer called it "the Marietta Look."

As Kirtley explained, "For nearly 50 years, the Hartman name has been synonymous with purveying fine antiques from southeastern Pennsylvania." The Miller-Worley house and collection, she noted, also showed off "Hartman's other talent — well-designed spaces in which to live comfortably with antiques."

Harry B. Hartman was born in Cape May, N.J., on July 1, 1930. His parents, John and Grace, reared him in Pennsylvania's Oley Valley. He later served in the US Navy. Interested in antiques since boyhood, he ran a shop in Lumberville, Penn., as a young man. In 1964, he moved to Marietta, where he was joined by business partner Oliver Overlander II. As Overlander recalled by phone, "I worked with Paul Ettline, who had a shop and ran a circuit of shows. Harry and I met at one of the shows."

Marietta was Hartman's home for the last half century. He helped found the Marietta Restoration Associates and through it contributed to the refurbishment of the town's Borough Hall, Union Meeting House and Bank Building. He helped establish the annual Marietta Candlelight Tour.

Hartman's first project in Marietta was the restoration of the White Swan Tavern, his base of operations before nearly being wiped out by Flood Agnes in 1972. Overlander, a long-serving mayor of Marietta, recalled, "We moved to 452 East Front Street around 1974. The building was originally a planing mill. Marietta had been big in the furniture business in its heyday. "Harry had many gifts," Overlander continued. "He was very good at design and always had upholstery and curtains people working for him. He knew landscaping. He could do a room or a house. It was nothing for him to have four or five jobs at a time. He often worked for generations of the same family." Hartman was blessed to live long enough to see Start with a House, Finish with a Collection, the sumptuous 2014 book that Leslie Miller wrote with Kirtley. In it, Miller describes her collaboration and long friendship with Hartman, who also worked with her mother, Anne, and her sister, Sarah. Her partnership with the dealer, to whom she dedicated the volume, began with a red chair-table that she and her husband, Richard, purchased from him at the Delaware Antiques Show in 1986



Miller told us, "Harry was one of a kind. He had a great eye, be it for antiques, fabrics or arranging furniture. It went hand-in-hand

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
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


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Detroit's Director Graham Beal Announces Plans To Retire In June

(AP) - The director of the Detroit Institute of Arts, who helped to protect the museum's collection from possible sale during the city's bankruptcy and spearheaded a \$158 million overhaul of the cultural attraction, announced on January 8 his plan to retire. Graham Beal plans to step aside June 30 after nearly 16 years as director, president and CEO. In a statement, he offered thanks to those whose talents and passion for the museum helped bring what he described as artistic, scholarly, political and legal success.

ride with some amazing highs far outweighing the other kind," said Beal, 67.

Beal's tenure included the 2001 to 2007 renovation and reinstallation of the museum's collection as well as approval of a ten-year property tax in 2012 from residents of Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties to support the museum. The city's financial turmoil, however, threatened to put the museum's future in doubt.

The museum was the focus of debate over whether cityowned art should be sold to ease the blow of Detroit's bankruptcy. An \$800 million prom-

"It has certainly been quite a ise from foundations, major corporations and the state, called the "Grand Bargain," helped protect the collection.

"Graham has also led the museum through extremely challenging economic times, developed international stature and respect for the DIA, strengthened the collection and initiated a culture change that resulted in the museum becoming more accessible to all," said Eugene Gargaro Jr, the DIA's board chairman.

Instead of the more traditional museum model of grouping objects by time period or style, the museum used techniques honed in the presentation of temporary or traveling exhibits to showcase its permanent collection. It also boosted community outreach, putting up ornately framed reproductions of some of its most significant paintings on the streets of Michigan communities as part of its "Inside/Out" series.

Gargaro is putting together a committee and will hire a firm to find a new director, the museum said.

Beal, whose bow ties were a notable fixture of his attire, is a native of Great Britain with degrees in English and art history from the University of Manchester and the Courtauld

Institute of Art. He served as director of the Los Angeles County Museum of Art from 1996 to 1999.

Under Beal's leadership, the institute hosted "Van Gogh: Face to Face" in 2000 and "Magnificenza! The Medici, Michelangelo and the Art of Late Renaissance Florence" in 2003 among its popular exhibitions. It also organized "Diego Rivera and Frida Kahlo in Detroit," which opens March 15.

"It has been ten years since I conceived of the idea for this exhibition and I draw no small pleasure that it will mark my exit as director," Beal said.

American Art Sale Brings \$3.4 Million At Freeman's

Auction Action In Philadelphia, Penn.

PHILADELPHIA, PENN. — Freeman's auction room was abuzz for the December 7 American art and Pennsylvania Impressionist sale. The 164-lot auction drew the interest of private collectors and museums alike and brought \$3.4 million. It was one of the highest totals achieved for a various-owner fine art auction in years and the most successful American art and Pennsylvania Impressionist auction since its inception 18 months ago. Works by N.C. Wyeth, Daniel Garber and George William Sotter headlined the auction, with six of the seven top lots sold to private collectors. Wyeth's "I Stood Like One Thunderstruck, or As If I Had Seen an Apparition" was the highlight of the day and fetched \$435,750.

"A year and half ago, we divided our fine art auctions into American art and Pennsylvania Impressionists, European art and Old Masters and Modern and contemporary art. I believe the success of this auction is a testament to that decision. It also confirms our position as the leading auction house for works by the Pennsylvania Impressionists and reflects the current health of the market for American art of quality," said vice chairman Alasdair Nichol.

Two of the high points from the sale were N.C. Wyeth paintings sold by the Wilmington Institute Library for the benefit of the institution. "I Stood Like One Thunderstruck, or As If I Had Seen an Apparition" tripled its low estimate of \$150,000, and "And No Sooner Had He the Arms in His Hands But, As If They Had Put New Vigor Into Him, He Flew Upon His Murders Like A Fury" more than doubled its presale estimate of \$120,000 to achieve \$267.750.

President of the board of managers Rodney Scott commented, "The library is thrilled with the sale results for the two Wyeth paintings. The income from the proceeds will provide expanded programs and services to its Wilmington users."

Other highlights from the Pennsylvania Impressionists section of the auction included two works by Daniel Garber --- "The River Road" sold for \$327,750, and "Up Jericho" brought \$207,750. George William Sotter's "The Hill Road, Winter" was another notable sale, bringing \$147,750. In September, these three paintings were showcased at Scotland's Lyon & Turnbull as part of Freeman's "Pennsylvania Impressionists in Scotland" exhibition. The show coincided with the Scottish National Gallery of Modern Art's exhibition of American Impressionism.

Prices reported include the buyer's premium. The next American art and Pennsylvania Impressionists auction will be conducted on June 7. Examples by N.C. Wyeth, Redfield, Sotter and Coppedge have already been consigned. For information, 267-414-1211 or www.freemansauction.com.

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
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Sotheby's To Offer Rare View Of Venice By Claude Monet In London Sale Feb. 3

LONDON — Sotheby's February 3 Impressionist and Modern art evening sale will be led by a rare view of Venice by Claude Monet, "Le Grand Canal" of 1908 (\$30.6/45.9 million).

Helena Newman, Sotheby's cohead, Impressionist & Modern art worldwide, said, "The market for works by Claude Monet has now reached an all-time point of strength, with bidders coming from four times as many countries as a decade ago. Reflecting the outstanding quality and beauty of the work, 'Le Grand Canal' was prominently displayed for eight years at the National Gallery, London. Given the painting's rarity and exceptional quality, and the strong price of £19.7 million [\$30.8 million] achieved when we sold Monet's Venice view 'Le Palais Contarini' in 2013, we anticipate enthusiastic global interest prior to the sale in February."

Painted during a three-month trip to Venice in 1908 — the year of one of the first Venice Biennales such works depicting Venice are highly sought after by collectors as they represent the peak of Monet's career. "Le Grand Canal" has been exhibited around the world, most recently on loan to the National Gallery, London, for eight years (2006-2014) and previously exhibited at the Kimbell Art Museum, Fort Worth, and the Royal Academy of Arts London

Prior to Sotheby's auction on February 3 in London, the painting will be exhibited in New York City January 21-23 and then in London (January 28 – February 3).

Majolica From Richard Scaife Estate To Be Sold At Clars January 17–19

OAKLAND, CALIF. — On December 15, 2014, Clars Auction Gallery announced that, in partnership with Christie's, New York, it had been chosen to present the collection of the estate of Richard Mellon Scaife at auction in 2015. Scaife amassed the collection traveling the world and buying in prestigious antiques and art galleries, including Jeremy Ltd, London and Earle D. Vandekar of Knightsbridge.

The collection was an important part of the interiors at his Pebble Beach, Calif.; Nantucket, Mass.; and Pittsburgh, Penn., residences.

This collection will be offered at both Christie's, which will host a single-owner sale of furniture and decorative arts in 2015, and Clars Auction Gallery, which will offer the remainder of the collection. The collection includes English porcelains dating to the early Eighteenth Century; majolica, including rare examples; and furniture dating from the Eighteenth Century to the present. Clars will conduct two sales focusing on the Scaife estate and collection January 17–19 and February 21–23, with

the remainder of the collection in its following monthly auctions.

Scaife's pieces selected for the January sale are mainly nautical in theme. Offerings date from the early to mid-Nineteenth Century, including pieces from the studio of George Jones. Highlights include shell-form compotes, early nautilus shell spoon warmers, clam-form flower frogs and highly decorated wall pockets.

Also of note from the Scaife collection will be a French industrial gilt-bronze automaton lighthouse clock and barometer, circa 1890. A miniature pietra dura specimen marble top table accented with red coral sprays is part of a large group of miniature furniture from the Scaife collection.

The Clars sale will also bring to auction offerings from other notable estates. From a prominent Pacific Heights, San Francisco estate is a Steinway and Sons, New York, Model O baby grand piano (\$25/35,000). In addition, there will be a collection of early American furniture, including a Chippendale slant

front desk, executed in mahogany, circa 1760-90.

America loved all 140 episodes of Rowan & Martin's Laugh-In, a television show that ran from 1968 to 1973 on the NBC network. Clars will offer three costumes worn by Ruth Buzzi and designed by Hollywood costume designer Michael Travis. The highlight of the costumes on offer is a Psychedelic Graduation costume. There are only two other known examples of this costume, and the example at Clars retains the original tag on the inside of the jacket to which Buzzi's name has been typed (\$5/7,000).

Rounding out the three-day event will be offerings in jewelry, fine art and Asian art and antiques. Highlighting the jewelry and timepieces category will be a gentleman's Breitling Navitimer Cosmonaute stainless steel wristwatch, circa 1962; a diamond three-stone ring in 14K yellow and white gold, set with old European cut diamonds totaling approximately 2.86 carats and a carved jadeite, diamond and 18K white gold pendant (\$7/9,000).

In fine art, the auction will feature an array of American and international works. One in particular is a watercolor by Jasper Francis Cropsey (American, 1823–1900) titled, "Sunset," 1894, a delicate work on paper by the Hudson River school artist (\$5/7,000). An oil on canvas by New York artist Leon Kroll (American, 1884–1975) titled "Nude Study" will also be featured. On the international side, a colorful yet dramatic painting titled "Teaching Our Young," 1988, by the Modernist Objibwa/Chippewa artist Norval Morrisseau (Canadian, 1932–2007), will be offered (\$6/8,000). Heading south to the end of North America is a vibrant oil on board, "Girl and Dog," by Rosa Rolanda (Mexican, 1897–1962) (\$6/8,000).

The Asian art and antiques category will offer an assortment of jade, including plaques, belt, toggles and a brush washer carved with bat-form handles. Another highlight will be an East Indian Mughal-type khan-

Watches Fetch \$7.2 Million At Sotheby's Auction

Patek Philippe retailed by Gübelin, yellow gold openfaced perpetual calendar split-seconds chronograph minute repeating watch with moon phases and black dial, Ref 658, made in 1937, sold for \$527,000.

NEW YORK CITY - Sotheby's final watch auction of 2014 concluded on December 10 with a total of \$7.2 million, raising the company's sales in this category to \$100.1 million for the year — the highest annual total in the firm's history.

The top lot was a Patek Philippe retailed by Gübelin, probably a unique yellow gold open-faced perpetual calendar split-seconds chronograph minute repeating watch with moon phases and black dial, Ref 658, made in 1937, which sold for \$527,000. Based on an exhaustive study of similar watches, it can be said that this watch is the first known Ref 658 to have been produced, and the only one of the 15 that were ever made to feature a black dial.



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Property from the Metzger collection featured a Courvoisier & Compe ormolu and mahogany two tune musical automaton birdcage clock with double singing and flying birds, no. 11359, circa 1820, realizing \$389,000. It led 16 rare examples of the best mechanical music on offer from the noted Metzger collection, totaling \$753.000

A Patek Philippe platinum split seconds chronograph wristwatch with register, Ref 5959, circa 2008, fetched \$257,000. With its "Officer"-style case, white dial and special italicized Arabic numerals, the watch bears many striking similarities to the earliest-known split second chronograph wristwatch: the no. 124824, started in 1903 and completed in 1923, which Sotheby's sold in June for \$2.9 million.


A rare rock crystal, mother-of-pearl, hardstone and gem-set desk timepiece by Black Starr & Frost and Pierre Gravoin, circa 1930, made \$377,000, while a rare stainless steel Rolex chronograph wristwatch with bracelet, Ref 6263 no. 2874356 "Paul Newman Daytona Panda," circa 1970, reached \$185,000.

An additional sale highlight was a rare yellow gold, enamel and pearl-set open-faced watch with enamel scene "Le Temps et les Parques" painted by Jeanne Vauthey, made in 1930, finishing at \$233,000. The watch is among a celebrated few Vacheron Constantin timepieces from the early Twentieth Century featuring a painted enamel scene. The image here depicts the Three Fates, who spin, measure and cut a length of yarn in an allegory for destiny.

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Illustration Art From Top Artists At Swann Galleries January 22

NEW YORK CITY — Swann Galleries' January 22 illustration art auction will feature fresh-to-market works by famous illustrators, cartoonists, commercial artists and children's book creators.

Among the beloved children's book illustrations are a gouache, pen and ink drawing of Ludwig Bemelmans's sassy heroine Madeline (\$4/6,000); Garth Williams' iconic spider web used as the endpapers for *Charlotte's Web*, pen and ink with pencil and wash, circa 1952 (\$10/15,000), and his original endpaper drawing for *Stuart Little*, also pen and ink with pencil and wash (\$15/25,000); and two classic watercolor and pencil illustrations by Maginel Wright Enright Barney — sister of architect Frank Lloyd Wright — who is credited with revolutionizing the quality of illustration in children's readers.


Works by popular contemporary illustrators include Gennady Spirin's magical works of art for *The Frog Princess*, watercolor, tempera and pencil on paper, 1994 (\$10/15,000) and two for a retelling of the Russian folktale "The Sea King's Daughter," 1997, a Russian party scene (\$10/15,000) and a portrait of the daughter in watercolor (\$8/12,000).

Appearing at auction for the first time are examples by Marilee Heyer, Jane Breskin Zalben and Daniel Andreasen of the wildly popular American Girl series.

For the first time, the auction offers a large and varied offering of advertising art with midcentury examples by James Neil Boyle, Phil Hays and Bob Peak; as well as fashion, printing company and beverage ads, including a recently discovered group of Royal Crown Cola mock-ups, among them a signed Frederick Sands Brunner canvas.

Also making their auction debut are James McMullan's designs for Lincoln Center posters. McMullan's work has appeared in *Esquire, Rolling Stone, Time* and *New York Magazine,* and since 1986 he has been the exclusive poster designer for the Lincoln Center Theater — designing more than 50 of them. Among his designs are watercolors on paper with hand lettered acetate overlays for *Dinner At Eight, 2002 (\$6/9,000)* and *King Lear,* starring Christopher Plummer, 2004 (\$4/6,000).

There is a newly recorded cartoon by Charles Addams,



A varied and amusing assortment of *New Yorker* magazine cartoons includes Saul Steinberg's "Equivalent of 8," pen and ink and collage on paper (\$3,5/5,000); Peter Arno's risqué "We've Lost Our Tour," pen, ink and wash on paper, 1953 (\$1,5/2,500); and Ed Sorel's "Election 1998," pen and ink and watercolor on paper, a variant of his cover for the November 11, 1996, issue (\$1/1,500).

There are also proposed *New Yorker* covers by Mischa Richter and a set of three by Max Rée in charming Art Deco style. Although none of these were realized as magazine covers, Rée's artwork did grace the cover of the *New Yorker* four times in 1925 (\$400/600 for the set).

Among examples by A-list illustrators are Howard Chandler Christy's "The farmer crossed the plowed

Dan Walsh's Works On Paper, Books & Paintings At Paula Cooper Gallery

NEW YORK CITY —The Paula Cooper Gallery is showing a selection of works by Dan Walsh, through February 14. The exhibition includes paintings, works on paper, books and mixed media, shedding light on Walsh's artistic evolution throughout the last 20 years.

Finest 19 & 20th Century Paintings fredparkerfineart.com Since the 1990s, Walsh has traced a particular trajectory in painting, working from a pared-down repertoire of elemental forms — lines, grids, squares and rectangles which he continuously reorganizes within the visual field. The paintings on view range from his earlier black and white tableaux to his more recent chromatic Cycle series, in which Walsh translates specific referents into his own

visual language. Proposing a dialogue between the systematic and the openended, Walsh employs a

Clocktower Antiques Center 824 East Main St (Rt. 1) Branford, CT • 203-488-1919 defined set of rules, which are used to progress toward complex surfaces that then activate the visual field. The artist layers strokes of paint, the logic of each informing and infiltrating the next. He describes this as an additive methodology in which the result is unexpected: a buildup of marks and bursts of color constituting more than the sum of its parts.

In the past 15 years, a large part of the artist's activity has also revolved around artist books, which he often develops as a sequential format in which to break apart and reassemble his own pictorial practice. Methodically repeated shapes, varying within a controlled set of parameters, allow the reader to delve into Walsh's art in near-narrative form.

Newly Discovered 1942 Joe DiMaggio Jersey Is On Offer In Goldin's Online Auction

WEST BERLIN, N.J. - The only known and authenticated Joe DiMaggio jersey from the 1942 wartime season is expected to set a record price in Goldin's winter auction, currently online through February 7 at www.goldinsuctions.com.

The jersey is historically significant for many reasons. It would be the last jersey "The Yankee Clipper" would wear before he enlisted in the US Army from 1943 to 1945 to serve his country during World War II.

"We are thrilled to offer this new find to collectors for the first time," said Ken Goldin, founder of Goldin Auctions. "It's not only incredible that this jersey is being offered for public sale for the first time ever after all of these years, but it's a minor miracle that any jersey, let alone a DiMaggio jersey, survived from the 1942 season as wartime rationing severely restricted sports supplies, and uniforms were recycled even more frequently than during the depression years."

In 1941, DiMaggio was coming off the most historic season of his career, having won the Most Valuable Player award and hit in his record 56 consecutive games, capped off by a World Series vic-tory over the Brooklyn Dodgers. He followed that up with a fine performance in 1942, hitting 21 home runs with 114 RBI and led the Yankees to another World Series appearance. When he took off this jersey for the last time in 1942, it would be four years until #5 was worn again, when "Joltin'

Although it is rare to successfully photo match a jersey that is 70 years old due to the poor quality of photography available, MEARS did find 1942dated photographs of the Yankee Clipper and established that he wore two different home jerseys that summer, noted as "Jersey #1" and "Jersey #2." The pinstripes found on the Yankees

home jersey act almost as fingerprints, as the famous blue stripes fall differently in relation to the graphics, sleeves and placket on each jersey. MEARS was able to state "there is a very high probability that the jersey identified as Jersey #2 could be the offered jersey" and an illustrated worksheet documents these findings.

The front of the classic home pinstripe jersey features the timeless intertwined "NY" in navy felt. The buttons are deemed to be the original ones and are still firmly affixed. The Spalding label is sewn inside the collar along with a size "44" strip tag. "Joe DiMaggio" is chain stitched in black on a white strip tag sewn below the size. A faded "Joe DiMaggio" signature is just below that. The left sleeve features a patriotic shield patch with three stars on a navy blue field above the word "Health." This patch was worn during the 1942 season by all players as part of the nationwide "Hale America" program to promote physical fitness. To further date the jersey, the year "42" is chain stitched in navy blue on the inside rear tail of the jersey. The back has DiMaggio's famed number "5" in navy blue felt.



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and the result produced 280 original pen and ink illustrations that were reproduced into a three-volume, 1,000-copy first edition run. The edition sold out and contributed to the American public's recognition of Moby Dick as a literary classic.

A recent addition to Westport Auction's January 25 sale will be "The Masthead Stander" that appeared on page 228 in the 1930 release of Moby Dick. The drawing depicts a sun soaked, far-gazed adolescent boy leaning against the mast pole with nothing but sky and a small platform around him. 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


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Proving Older Is Not Always Better, Late Russian Icons Lead Jackson's

Auction Action In Cedar Falls, Iowa

CEDAR FALLS, IOWA -Jackson's International Auctioneers and Appraisers' November 18-19 World Treasures auction featuring Russian, Asian, European and American fine art totaled \$3.6 million, with a sell-through rate of just over 90 percent. Not surprisingly, Russian arts and antiques proved a strong category here as Jackson's has gained an international reputation and following in this genre. The sale attracted more than 700 registered bidders representing more than 37 countries worldwide.

The auction featured the lifelong collection of Russian

icons from the estate of the late Jose Antonio Danobeitia (1942-2011) of Toronto, Canada, as well as examples from other smaller collections. There were no shortages of buyers for the fine and unusual, and when it came to Russian icons, the trend of choice later examples, circa 1880-1915 again dramatically outpaced what was once the focal point of every Russian icon collection: early pre-Seventeenth Century icons.

A unique icon was a 12-by-10-inch icon of St Nicholas, circa 1900, which had been presented to Pope John Paul II during a visit to the Vatican by then-Russian President Boris Yeltsin in 1991. The Pope later gave it to his secretary Stanislaw Dziwisz who in turn gave it to Monsignor Michael Dylag, the consignor. Estimated at \$10/20,000, the icon attained \$143,750 from a collector in St Petersburg, Russia.

The sale opened with a fine selection of Russian icons over 250 in all — including a Western-style oil on metal icon of the Last Supper with ornate gilt-bronze Byzantine frame-

> work, circa 1890. It soared over its \$15/25,000 estimate to end at \$262,000. There have apparently been three similar icons contained in identical frames surface in the last decade, the first one sold was attributed to as having come from the famous Moscow Cathedral of Christ the Savior. Further research has shed doubt on that attribution.

A scarce 12-by-10-inch icon depicting saints Vladimir, Alexander, and Boris from the workshop of noted court iconographer Iosif S. Chirikov, signed and dated 1891, went for \$250,000 against a \$30/50,000 estimate. The icon attracted seven phone bidders (all from Russia) and went to a collector in St Petersburg.

Other noteworthy icon sales include a Western-style example depicting St Alexandra, executed on copper and with silver frame by Ovchinikov and with the verso displaying a dedicatory inscription on dated 1909 and related the Krupenskiy family, a large and aristocratic Bessarabian family from Moldovia. It sold for \$62,500 to the phone. A small, finely painted miniature

image of Christ with silver frame by Faberge went to a Moscow buyer for \$50,000.

American art was led by a 16by-23-inch oil on artist board painting of a festive Indian encampment by A LaVerne Nelson Black, which fetched \$115,000 from a private Midwest collector and by a Sierra Mountain landscape by Edgar A. Payne that finished at \$50,000, selling to a California buyer via the phone.

A typical bayou scene by Joseph Rusling Meeker sold above estimate to a private collector for \$33,750, while a fresh-to-the-market landscape in original Newcomb Macklin frame by Tony Angarola set a new auction record for the artist at \$21,250 against the conservative \$800-\$1,200 estimate.

European bronzes fared well, including a model of Fremiet's St George Slaying the Dragon, cast by Barbedienne, \$8,125, and a Nineteenth Century bronze figural hunt scene garniture going to a Russian buyer for \$12,500. A "literary bear" by French sculptor Christophe Fratin soared to \$10,625 and an example of Louis Ernest Barrias' "Fame" took \$9,375.

Other notable sales includes an oil on canvas abstract by Indian artist Laxman Shrestha for a strong \$17,500 and a two-volume set of the History of the Expedition (Lewis and Clark), Bradford & Inskeep, 1814, including the important fold-out map found in the first volume, at \$55,000. Typically a rare offering, the lot was one of three two-set volumes that were offered at auction within 30 days of each other at various auction houses in the United States.

The sale ended with a small offering of Asian works, featuring an oil on canvas painting of two women drinking tea by Vietnamese French artist Le Pho at \$40,000 and a pair of paintings by Vietnamese artist Vu Cao Dam, each at \$18,750.

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Major William Glackens Exhibit On View At Barnes Foundation

PHILADELPHIA, PENN. — The Barnes Foundation is presenting the first major exhibition of Philadelphia native William Glackens in nearly 50 years. On view to February 2, the exhibition showcases more than 90 paintings and works on paper by the artist and lifelong friend of Dr Albert Barnes.

Nineteenth Century French Lithography On View At The Hyde Collection

GLENS FALLS, N.Y. — With 31 prints from The Hyde's Tobin Sparling Family Collection, "Stone Palette: Lithographs in Nineteenth Century France," on view at the museum through March 15, explores lithography as a creative medium.

"Stone Palette" demonstrates a wide variety of styles and techniques typical of the Nineteenth Century expressed in this new and exciting medium of the day. Some very early examples of color lithography, as well as black and white prints that span the century, are on view. "The Stone Palette" is a survey of many of the important French artists of the century who found new levels of creative freedom by creating lithographic prints. The exhibition also contains a Nineteenth-Century lithographic stone with an idealized image of "Justice" drawn on its surface as if ready for printing. The term lithography comes from the Greek, lithos "stone" and grapho "to write," thus "to write on stone." The process of "chemical printing" (as the inventor called it) is just that, "writing (drawing) on stone." Lithography was invented by Alois Senefelder in Austria in 1798 and patented as a printing medium in 1799. Originally devised by Senefelder as a process for printing theater scripts, it saw dramatic investigation and refinement in the early Nineteenth Century as both a commercial printing



process and as a means for artists to print directly from their drawings to make limited edition prints.

Improvements in lithographic drawing materials and chemical processes were made in France largely as the result of experimentation by Godefroy Engelmann (represented in the exhibition) who moved his press from Mulhouse, Germany, to Paris in 1816. As a result of his efforts and others, the media became very attractive to artists in particular. For the first time, a printmaking media offered the artist the immediacy of drawing on paper and the flexibility to explore a wide range of visual effects. The popularity of artists such as Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec, Alphonse Mucha, and Théodore Géricault exploded along with






NEW YORK CITY — No US president and few leaders of any time or place have commanded language with the skill of Abraham Lincoln. Largely self-taught, he achieved a mastery of the word that helped him win the presidency and define the true meaning of America's founding principle of human equality. orator to sustain the country during its greatest crisis, and "Lincoln Speaks" includes not only well-known documents such as the Gettysburg Address, but a number of infrequently exhibited items that serve as powerful - and perhaps unexpected — reminders of the man behind the genius.

Coinciding with the 150th anniversary of his assassination and the conclusion of the Civil War, visitors will see up-close how the most common of men reached uncommon heights of eloquence. The exhibition will also include a selection of photographs and artifacts from Lincoln's time, as well as a short, in-gallery film that features contemporary writers and scholars sharing their personal views on his matchless gifts with language.

Drawing heavily on its renowned collection of American historical documents, the exhibition is presented thematically and chronologically, with additional contributions from the Shapell Foundation, Harvard College Library, the Library of Congress and the Morgan's collection of Lincoln manuscripts and letters.

Divided into nine sections that explore Lincoln's development as a writer and speaker, "Lincoln Speaks" includes photographic portraits and

Christie's To Offer Modern, Surrealist & Postwar Works

LONDON — Christie's will offer a group of 24 Modern and Surrealist works presenting Reality and Surreality: A Twentieth Century Dialogue, which will be auctioned across the Impressionist and Modern art evening sale and Art of the Surreal evening sale on February 4. These Modern and Surrealist works are offered along with a small group of six postwar art works as property from a European collection. Highlighting the flair and vision underpinning the collection, these works present the market with an inspiring, thoughtprovoking and rich journey, examples showcasing bv Modigliani, Miró, Magritte, Delvaux, Picasso, Giacometti, Moore, Fontana and others.

The group is led by Joan Miró's "L'oiseau au plumage déployé vole vers l'arbre argenté," 1953 (\$10/14 million) and Amedeo Modigliani's "Les deux filles," 1918 (\$9/12 million). The full collection of 31 Modern, Surrealist and postwar works of art is expected to realize in excess of \$100 million.

A diverse group of three works by Miró points to the breadth of techniques and media that the artist worked in, from oil on canvas and oil on burlap to gouache on black paper. The artist's key themes and subjects ranged from poetry and dreams to music and stars, women and birds; he was an artist who allowed himself to be influenced by a range of things, from music, poetry and hallucinations induced by hunger during his early years in Paris to patterns made by chance.

The group is led by "L'oiseau au plumage déployé vole vers l'arbre argenté," 1953, which is an example of his artistic developments in the early 1950s. Evoking a fantastical world,

populated by curious creatures, the work combines the poetry of its title with Miró's enticing visual universe. This work was once part of the celebrated American collection of Edgar Kaufmann Jr.

"Les deux filles" is a rare double portrait by Amedeo Modigliani (1884–1920), which is offered at auction for only the second time, having previously been in the same family collection for more than 90 years (\$9/12 million). One of only five recognized double portraits by Modigliani, this painting is preserved in its original unlined condition. Modigliani used his portraits to provide a visual window into the soul. Two girls are portrayed sitting side by side, highlighting the contrast of age and life experience of the two sitters. The elder girl also appears in an individual portrait by the artist now in the Kunstmuseum Basel.

"Femme de Venise V" by Alberto Giacometti (1901–1966) was conceived in 1956 and cast in the artist's lifetime (\$9/12 million). The present bronze, which exhibits a rich brown and green patina, belongs to the series of sculptures known as the "Femmes de Venise." The series comprises nine individual but closely related figures cast in bronze, which played a significant role in establishing Giacometti's fame and reputation as the most important sculptor of the postwar era.

A total of eight works by René Magritte (1898–1967) — four oils on canvas and four gouaches on paper — span his oeuvre and include much of his most iconic imagery. The group is led by the triumphantly eerie "Les compagnons de la peur," 1942, which centers on the subject of transformation, challenging the realms of possibility and turning the traditions of landscape and portraiture on their head, to present perched atop a mountain four owls transforming from bird to plant world, or viceversa (\$4.2/5.4 million). Another large-scale work is "Quand

l'heure sonnera," circa 1964–1965 (\$4.2/5.4 million).

Additional highlights include "Nature morte à la cruche," 1937, by Pablo Picasso (1881–1973) (\$1.2/1.8 million); "Le bout du monde," 1969, by Paul Delvaux (1897–1994) (\$1.8/2.8 million); and "Concetto spaziale, Attese (il sole)," 1959, by Lucio Fontana (1899–1968) (\$1.5/2.3 million).

The sale will also offer a masterpiece by Paul Cézanne, "Vue sur L'Estaque et Le Château d'If," which comes to the market for the first time since it was acquired in 1936 by Samuel Courtauld, the founder of the Courtauld Gallery and Institute of Art in London (\$12/18 million). The painting remained in Courtauld's private collection throughout his



lifetime and following his generous bequest to the Courtauld Gallery.

This magisterial work was painted circa 1883–1885, during one of the last visits that Cézanne ever made to L'Estaque, a fishing port and small seaside resort in his native Provence, where he sought inspiration repeatedly from the mid-1860s. This is a rare example on a vertical canvas of Cézanne's treatment of this iconic motif; the format lends the composition stately dignity and remarkable concentration of color and form.

'Wild Nature: Masterworks From The Adirondack Museum' At The Hyde

GLENS FALLS, N.Y. — The Hyde Collection opens its 2015 exhibition schedule with an exhibition drawn from the permanent collection of the Adirondack Museum in Blue Mountain Lake, N.Y. From January 18 through April 12, "Wild Nature: Masterworks from the Adirondack Museum" will be on view in the Hyde's Wood Gallery.

Over the course of two centuries, the Adirondack Mountains in upstate New York have attracted tourists, sportsmen and artists alike from across the nation. The exhibition features 62 stunning masterpieces dating from 1821 to 2001, including paintings and rarely exhibited photographs and prints. Together these works reveal how images of the Adirondack landscape shaped American perceptions of the wilderness landscape, and how these expectations, in turn, created wilderness as a national icon.

In the Twentieth Century, artists working in the Adirondacks parted from the conventions of their Nineteenth Century predecessors, evident in featured works by Harold Weston, John Marin, Rockwell Kent, Amy Jones, Jonas Lie, Dorothy Dehner and David Smith. The exhibition explores how themes of wilderness persist in the work of these modern artists while their abstract or realist approach, combined with their personal own expression, changing attitudes reflects toward the natural environment.

This exhibition also highlights a selection of large-format albumen prints by Seneca Ray Stoddard who, more than any other photographer, shaped the popular image of the Adirondacks, as well as prints by the famed publishers Currier & Ives, among others.

MIA Kicks Off Centennial With Modernist Loan

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — The Minneapolis Institute of Arts is kicking off its centennial year with a long-term loan of Modernist paintings.

The museum made the surprise announcement January 1 as it launched a yearlong celebration. The loan includes more than 550 painting, sculptures, prints and drawings collected by the late Myron Kunin, founder of the Regis Corp.

Minnesota Public Radio News

reports the collection is believed to be one of the foremost collections of Modernist painting in private hands.

MIA curator of painting Patrick Noon says the Kunin loan fills one of the major gaps in the museum's collection.

PORTSMOUTH, N.H. - Nan ment of quality Americana, Gurley has the formula down pat. She has been doing antiques shows for more than 30 years and her loyal following is evidence of her success. Her New Year's Day show at the Frank Jones Center delivered willing buyers to an exceptionally fine group of dealers from all over New England. Her formula is simple: produce a show in a quality facility that is low cost to her dealers, and be certain that each dealer brings highquality, fresh merchandise. The buyers come, knowing they will see a wide assort-

much of which they have not seen before, from top dealers and at reasonable prices.

The day was cold, but that did not deter knowledgeable collectors and dealers. There was a line waiting for the show to open and attendance was strong throughout the day. Sold tags appeared within a few minutes of opening. Gurley told Antiques and The Arts Weekly, "People always look forward to the New Year's show. Collectors and dealers are ready to get back to work after the holidays. Attendance was up a bit from previous

years and selling was strong all day. I think it will be a good year for the business."

The emphasis of the show is always country, but a variety of other neat things can always be found. Chip Neschke brought several pieces of European, mid-Twentieth Century studio pottery, a couple of small George Ohr pots and two pieces of Mimbres pottery. Neschke said that the mid-Twentieth Century European studio pottery has not really come into its own yet, but collector interest is growing.

Hillary Nolan had several pieces of good furniture being examined by potential buyers. One of the more unusual items at the show was a large bronze lion, about 3 feet tall, which came from a warehouse in Worcester, Mass. Ian McKelvey from Connecticut sold it about ten minutes after the show opened.

Reliable provenance is not always available with Native American antiques. Brian Cullity of Sandwich, Mass., however, had a Chippewa bandolier bag that came with a framed, handwritten note indicating that the bag came from the White Earth Reservation. The note said that "hunting bags such as this were worn by chiefs, such as Shabausch Kung, Little Bear

from English factories in lustre and transfer decorated ones made by Spode.

We cannot talk about interesting items that are not American without talking about Ross Levett from Thomaston, Maine. He offers ancient objects from Asia, Europe and Islamic regions and ethnographic material. When Levett describes an item as "early," he probably does not mean it the way folks who deal in American country mean it. He had an unusual bronze pot. When asked what it was, he identified it as a Sixteenth Century Germanic bronze cooking pot. It had been in the collection of the late Frank Cowan. Levett also had a good family record and interesting Asian smalls.

Bev Weir-Longacre is well known for selling Christmas items and she had a fine display in the booth she shares with her husband, Tom Longacre. She had an assortment of Christmas ornaments, Santas and a white feather tree. She said, "2014 was a very active year for me with Christmas-related items. I have a strong following for ornaments, feather trees and Christmas accessories. I sold a few hundred ornaments and various other items, such as Dresdens, Santas in sleighs, large angels and more. It's a great part of the antiques world and has become a yearround business for me.'

Paul DeCoste, West Newbury, Mass., had a folding



pocket knife with the words "For New England Whalers" stamped into the blade. DeCoste said that he had never seen one like it before. He also had a nice double valentine, handsailor's wrought hinges and a door latch, along with some country woodenware and a blown glass whale oil lamp. A favorite item was a circa 1875 peddler doll. Susan Gault brought it from Vermont. It was well dressed and had a wax head, eyes that opened, a straw bonnet and an offering of miniature potholders for housewives.

Stephen-Douglas, as always, had a wide assortment of early smalls, mocha, some interesting furniture, redware, painted tin and a very nice, reasonably priced, brass bed warmer with an engraved pea-fowl on its cover. Harold Cole and Bettina Krainin had an unusual stage coach sign, circa 1920, showing a heavily loaded English coach and team. Mike and Lucinda Vt., Pittsford, Seward, brought country items, including a large early cradle.

Gurley runs monthly shows at the Frank Jones Center. Ever wondered who Frank Jones was? Turns out he was an important historical figure in these parts, recalled in the biography Frank Jones, King of the Ale Makers. He was born in Barrington, N.H., in 1832 to a hardworking farm family and received little schooling. He moved to Portsmouth in 1839 and started selling stoves. Eventually a brewer, Jones later enjoyed a political career, and was one of the wealthiest men in the United States when he died in 1902.

PBA Galleries To Offer Whaling Journal In Americana Auction

SAN FRANCISCO, CALIF. — A mid-Nineteenth Century manuscript journal and log book documenting a 3½-year whaling expedition will be the highlight of PBA Galleries' January 29 sale of Americana, including African American history, travel, exploration and cartography, beginning at 11 am. More than

There is a section of African American historical material extending from the dark days of slavery to the end of segregation in the US Army and beyond. Works on travel and exploration bring together the four corners of the world with a section of scarce items relating to China, publications from the Hakluyt Society and natural history by Alfred Russel Wallace. Finally, there are maps of the world and Americas, city views by Braun & Hogenberg, scarce local maps of California towns and counties

and more.

The whaling journal written by Captain Aaron C. Cushman chronicles the journey of the George Howland, which left New Bedford, Mass., for the Pacific Ocean in May 1842 and returned in November 1845 (\$20/30,000). The manuscript includes daily or nearly daily entries recording the weather, sailing conditions, route, longitude and latitude, plus whaling activities, such as sighting whales, lowering boats, striking the whales, pulling them alongside the ship, cutting them up and boiling them down

to whale oil. Other activities documented are stowing the barrels of oil, mending sails, painting the boat and gathering or purchasing supplies when ashore.

Greatly enhancing the journal are some 100 watercolor drawings, ranging from simple depictions of whale tails to indicate sighting but not capturing whales to three full-page watercolors of the ship and whaling activities. Superbly executed, the watercolors represent the epitome of American folk art of the Nineteenth Century. The exceptional array of illustrations shows the essence of the whaling expedition with drawings of the ships, whales and smaller whaleboats capturing the huge animals. One illustration of a capsized whaleboat, with a coffin floating in the sea, accompanies text relating how a crew member was drowned when the whaleboat was overturned.

Antiques Forum To Reveal Treasures From The Southern Backcountry

WILLIAMSBURG, VA. — The Colonial Williamsburg Foundation's 67th Antiques Forum blazes a trail into the early American frontier February 20–24 with a look at "New Findings in the Arts of the Southern Backcountry."


Following the previous year's look at the elegant, conforming pieces of the coastal South, the 2015 forum examines the emerging body of diverse crafts born of ingenuity and creativity — often absent formal training or the dictates of prevailing styles from the Virginia Piedmont south to the Gulf of Mexico, a region then known as "the backcountry."

"Research is revealing great insights into antiques from the backcountry South, and with them the stories of the people who crafted and valued them," said Ronald L. Hurst, Colonial Williamsburg vice president of collections, conservation and museums and Carlisle H. Humelsine chief curator. "This year's forum, with its extensive workshops and expert lectures, will vividly illuminate those stories for our participants."

Notable forum guests include Dale L. Couch, curator of decorative arts at the Georgia Museum of Art's Henry Green Center; Robert A. Leath, chief curator and vice president for the Museum of Early Southern Decorative Arts (MESDA) at Old Salem; and Jeffrey S. Evans, president and chief auctioneer at Jeffrey S. Evans & Associates.

Couch will deliver a lecture titled "Georgia Fever: Chesapeake Culture Goes Southward." Leath will address "Friendly Furniture: The Influence of Quaker Cabinetmaking in the Southern Backcountry," and Evans will discuss "Shenandoah Valley Seating — On Stage."

Other sessions include Carroll Van West, director of the





The optional "Knights of the Golden Horseshoe Tour" preceding this year's Colonial Williamsburg Antiques Forum will visit northern Shenandoah Valley estates, including Harewood in Jefferson County, W.Va. Built in 1770 by George Washington's younger brother Samuel, the home remains in the family with interiors largely intact to the period of construction.

Middle Tennessee State University Center for Historic Preservation, with the Chipstone lecture, "From Backcountry to Heartland: Material Culture and the Transformation of the Southern Backcountry"; June Lucas, research director at MESDA, with "Sober and Respectable:' Furniture of the Scots-Irish in the Southern Backcountry"; and collector and independent scholar Macklin Cox on "Exploring Early Furniture of the Kentucky Bluegrass Region."

Johanna M. Brown, curator of Moravian decorative arts at Old Salem Museums and Gardens, will discuss "Neat and Simple Elegance: Moravian Decorative Arts in North Carolina"; and John Case, president of Case Antiques and Auctions, will address "The Haun Pottery of Green County, Tennessee: Chronicling the Discovery of American Earthenware Masterpieces."

Forum sessions are conducted at the Williamsburg Lodge. Christie's Presents Abbott-Guggenheim: A New York Kunstkammer On Jan. 27

NEW YORK CITY — Christie's sale of the Abbott-Guggenheim collection, comprising Renaissance and baroque sculptures, clocks and works of art, will be on January 27. Dr Peter Guggenheim (1927–2012) began a lifetime of collecting when he acquired a cuckoo clock as a gift from his

grandfather, Daniel, at the age of 6.

Peter continued the Guggenheim family's great legacy of collecting in the traditional Kunstkammer manner and for more than 60 years, together with Dr John Abbott (b 1925), they cultivated a renowned collection and generously loaned works to the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Frick Collection, the Smithsonian, the Louvre and the Royal Academy, among others. Spread over three centuries, the artists included in this collection are among the best of their generations. With approximately 120 lots, the sale is expected to exceed \$11 million. Both leaders in the field of psychiatry, Abbott and Guggenheim were true connoisseurs and assembled their collection in the old-world tradition, without using advisors and by relying on their instincts. The Abbott-Guggenheim collection has been displayed for decades at their horse farm in New York's Hudson River Valley and includes such luminaries as Severo, Tetrode, Prieur, Tacca, Maderno, Fanelli and Houdon. Celebrated clockmakers Schmidt the Younger,



Miller and Kreitmeir are also included.

Highlights include a bronze ecorche of a man by Willem Danielsz. Van Tetrode (circa 1525-1580), Roman or Florentine, late 1560s, 19 inches high (\$1.5/2.5 million); a bronze figure of Hercules Pomarius by Tetrode, third quarter Sixteenth Century, $21\frac{1}{4}$ inches (\$1.5/2.5million); and a bronze figure of Neptune (formerly a table fountain) attributed to Benedikt Wurzelbauer (1548 - 1620),Nuremburg, circa 1600, 26 inches high (\$250/400,000). 











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Thomas Collins Named New Executive Director & President, Barnes Foundation


Collins served for five years as

'More Paintings About Poets & Food' By Djordje Ozbolt At Hauser & Wirth

NEW YORK CITY — Hauser & Wirth is presenting "More paintings about poets and food," the gallery's first New York exhibition devoted to Belgradeborn, London-based artist Djordje Ozbolt, which is on view through February 21.

Based in London since the mid-1990s, Ozbolt is a voracious traveler and exoticist whose work wistfully ransacks cultures, traditions, curiosities and epochs. Collapsing the narratives of his paintings and sculptures into solitary images, Ozbolt creates mysterious and often macabre imagery that persistently conflates traditional European genres - of portraiture, still life, landscape and history painting – with motifs sourced from Christianity, African and Asian art, and cultural stereotypes, all overlaid with the artist's signature sharp wit. Central to the exhibition is Ozbolt's new work '50 ways to leave your lover' (2014), a major installation - and the largest work created by the artist to date - of 50 paintings presented. 'More paintings about poets and food' also presents a group of new drawings that depict exotic settings populated by surreal creatures or hybrid portraits of stereotypical symbols of Americana. These witty works reveal the role that stream of consciousness and free association play in Ozbolt's work. As such, they suggest a kind of codex to his studio practice and the other works on view in the exhibition.

Large Crowds Arrive Right On Schedule For Glastonbury Show

GLASTONBURY, CONN. — Veterans of the popular one-day Glastonbury Antiques and Collectibles New Year's Show rely on the show's management to make their wait comfortable as they assemble before the show opens. Keeping them out of the winter cold outside the Glastonbury High School involves a serpentine accommodation that causes their rapidly forming numbers to snake from the entrance, down a hallway and then through another door leading into the gymnasium. It is a formula that has worked for years in this granddaddy of a show that marked its 34th year on the first day of 2015.

Remarkably, the person standing first in line was a newcomer to the show — none other than the trade's own Lew Scranton, the Killingworth, Conn., dealer well known for his collection of early New England furniture, redware and slipware and American decorated tin. "This is my first time here," said the dealer, adding, "I usually have a New Year's Eve gathering, but this year I did not and that allowed me to get up early enough to come here." So what space next year." Barrows said seven-drawer spice or whatnot

was he looking for amid the 130 or so dealer booths inside? "Anything I can make money on," he quipped.

Inside the gymnasium, show manager Robert Barrows was getting his cadre of exhibitors ready, as well as overseeing volunteers from the Glastonbury Exchange Club, the show's sponsor, prior to the 9 am opening. As the crowd was let in, the show floor quickly filled with shoppers, many of them familiar faces from the trade, who, like Scranton, were keenly hunting for new, good inventory, but there was a large retail component as well, vying for dealers' attention, asking questions and examining the merchandise while exhibitors anxiously wrote up sales slips.

"The show was very good," commented Barrows. "There were more in attendance than last year, and the activity stayed steady though the day. As always, some dealers said they had their best show ever and others did not do so well. The handful of dealers that were new to the show said they would like to have the same there were approximately 25 dealers who were new to the show this year. He has space for 138 booths in the gymnasium and "there was only one empty space unfilled on the day of the show."

The promoter said he could not put an exact number on the day's attendance, but last year he reported that slightly more than 2,600 people attended the show. Snow, which in some years has hampered showgoers, was not in the forecast this January 1, and the day dawned with bright, sunny skies.

As for sales, Barrows commented that he saw mostly small items leaving the floor, but that in many cases furniture sales involve the buyer making arrangements with the dealer to have the piece delivered after the show.

Flint Hill, Va., dealer Jeanne Kaufmann offered a selection of early textiles and country items ranging from a New England late Nineteenth Century wooden horse that at one point had had rockers to an arrow weathervane picked off a farm in northern Indiana to a small

chest from the early Twentieth Century in brown paint. Although in business for some 30 years, this was the first time Kaufmann has done this show.

Woodbridge, Conn., dealer Paul Bessinger, who does business as Home City Antiques, was taking advantage of a noshow, spreading out his collection in two spaces across the aisle from one another. Highlights were an early Twentieth Century Satsuma vase by Japanese artist Kyoto Kinkozan and a blue and white Imari platter decorated with rare American eagles.

There was plenty of primitive country on offer by Richard Fuller of South Royalton, Vt. His collection included an 1840s oil on canvas of a gentleman from Ohio, a New England farm scene hooked rug from the turn of the century, a dry sink from Connecticut, mid-1880s in red wash paint, and an upstate New York cupboard in gray paint with five shelves.

It used to be a utilitarian tool of the publishing trade - a small wooden wagon used to deliver the Chicago Daily News. Now it was a colorful repository for several Steiff animals that had been brought to the show by Deep River, Conn., dealer Rae Seifert, who specializes in children's things and country antiques. "It came out of a barn in Rhode Island," said Seifert about the wagon parked on her table in back of a pull-toy bunny from the 1930s-40s.

Sharing a booth were Richard Camargo and Elliot Alter, West Hartford, Conn., dealers with collections of military antiques, stamps, Georg Jensen silver jewelry and gallery posters that Camargo finds in his travels to

France.

New Haven, Conn., dealer W.S. Korzick Antiques was busy assisting prospective buyers throughout the morning, as the eclectic selection of items being offered attracted attention. Among the pieces being examined in the booth were a Chinese apothecary from the 1800s with 45 drawers, an English sterling carriage clock with French movement hallmarked 1906 with its original leather traveling box and a collection of wristwatches that included an Omega chronograph from the 1940s.

Jane Sterry of Portland, Conn., normally offers her textiles and quilts collection under the aegis of Patches & Patchwork. Here, however, she was showing some of the things she personally has collected over the past 35 years, including a

remarkable find - a neverused double wedding ring quilt, which, in her words, was "quilted to high heavens" but for some unknown reason was left unfinished by its maker. Sterry scouted examples and ultimately found a binding that matched the quilt's original colors — and, voila, a pristine, finished piece for someone to enjoy.

Although country dominates this show, there were some outliers, such as a tandem sling bench created by designers Charles and Ray Eames for Herman Miller in 1962, vinyl and chromed aluminum, and a "great size for the home," according to dealer Albert Joseph, Woodbury, Conn. A pair of mahogany club chairs from the 1930s-40s, looked yummy with their lemon gold upholstery, and the dealer also exhibited a magnificent china cabinet in mahogany attributed to R.J. Horner, New York, circa 1875.

Connecticut's deep decoy tradition was on view in the booth of Tom Reiley, Manchester, Conn., who specializes in decoys, Americana and smalls. Reiley, who said he only deals in working decoys, had many factory-turned examples by the Wildfowler Decoy Co., of Old Saybrook, Conn., but also handcarved examples by makers like Roswell and Bliss.



Northwest Coast Raven Rattles Shake Way To Bonhams' Native American Art Auction

Auction Action In San Francisco, Calif.

SAN FRANCISCO, CALIF. — Two Northwest Coast raven rattles stood out in Bonhams' \$1.4 million Native American Art auction December 8. Each flew past their estimates of \$20/30,000 and \$20/40,000 to bring \$62,500 and \$50,000, respectively.

A standout in the Eskimo/Northwest Coast category was a Chilkat blanket that achieved \$35,000 and a Kingnait/Cape Dorset dancing bear sculpture by Pauta Saila that brought \$18,750.

Bonhams' vice president and director of the ethnographic art department Jim Haas, said, "In today's market, we are finding continued strong interest in top-of-the-line antique material, but contemporary works of art are finding their way more and more to the auction block, and the work of famous artists is certain to attract attention."

Pottery induced strong bidding, led by a Santa Clara carved blackware jar by Tammy Garcia, 2006, for \$47,500; a San Ildefonso polychrome turtle, one of a handful made by Tony Da, \$27,500; a San Ildefonso lidded sgraffito redware jar, also by Da, \$22,500; and a Hopi creamware architectural vessel from Al Qoyawayma, \$10,625.

Southwest related sculptures garnered attention too. An Allan Houser bronze sculpture "Mother's Blessing" realized \$35,000, while a Roxanne Swentzell ceramic sculpture took

\$25,000.

Weavings that did particularly well included a rare Navajo sand-painting rug for \$25,000, a classic Saltillo poncho at \$22,500; a late classic / early transitional child's Navajo blanket for \$13,750 and a Navajo Two Grey Hills tapestry by Julia Jumbo, \$10,000.

Rounding out the sale were a monumental Apache olla at \$40,000, a Hopi bracelet by Charles Loloma for \$16,250 and from the Plains / Plateau / Woodlands portion of the sale, a Sioux beaded pictorial hide that achieved \$17,500.

Encompassing the Seventeenth through early Nineteenth Centuries, the auction presents a broad selection of furniture, decorations, porcelain, Georgian silver, sculpture. clocks. chandeliers, sconces, tapestries and rugs. The Old Master paintings and drawings section offers landscapes, still lifes, portraits and religious subjects by European artists from the Renaissance to the Nineteenth Century.

Highlighting the furniture offerings is a George II mahogany desk and bookcase attributed to Giles Grendey, circa 1735(\$12/18,000). Grendey (1693-1780) of Aylesbury House, St John's Square, Clerkenwell, was described as a "great dealer in the cabinet way" and an "eminent timber merchant." Although it is obvious that Grendey's business was considerable, only a small number of documents exist recording the names of his clients and the extent and nature of their commissions. A suite of scarlet japanned furniture was supplied by Grendey to the Duke of Infantado, Lazcano Palace, Spain. Comprising some 77 pieces, the suite also included several desk and

bookcases of remarkable similarity to the present example. This desk and bookcase can be firmly attributed to Grendey.

Also noteworthy is a George III mahogany secretaire chest of drawers with galleried twotier open shelves attributed to Thomas Chippendale, circa 1770 (\$5/7,000). It is almost identical to an example formerly at Hornby Castle, Yorkshire.

A pair of George III giltwood open armchairs, after a design by architect James Wyatt, circa 1785 (\$2/4,000), in which the form relates to a pattern from the 1770s created by Wyatt.

Continental furniture includes an early Nineteenth Century Russian Neoclassical gilt-metal mounted bookcase (\$8/12,000) and a mid-Seventeenth Century South German Baroque fassendenschrank of walnut, maple, fruitwood, pine and various other woods (\$3/5,000).

The sale offers a selection of Italian Sixteenth and Seventeenth Century bronzes, including a pair of Venetian bronze candlesticks (\$5/7,000). Tapestries include an Eighteenth Century Flemish example depicting a couple in the foreground with hunters chasing prey in a wooded landscape, height 10 feet 8 inches, width 8 feet 5 inches (\$12/18,000).

Old Master paintings feature a portrait of "Louis Francois Marie Le Tellier, Marquis de Barbezieux, Secretaire d'Etat a la Guerre (1668-1701)," by Pierre Mignard (French, 1612-1695) (\$20/\$40,000). The Marquis de Barbezieux was appointed by King Louis XIV to the post of Secretaire d'Etat a la Guerre in 1691, when he was only 23, and he remained in that office until his death a decade later. This portrait by Mignard was engraved by Cornelis Vermeulen; a preparatory drawing for it is in the collection of the Musee du Louvre.

By Juriaen (Jurgen) Ovens (Dutch, 1623–1678) is a portrait of Cornelis Nuyts (1574–1661), a well-to-do merchant and confectioner in Seventeenth Century Amsterdam. (\$8/12,000). Another portrait of him at the age of 84 by Juriaen Ovens, extensively inscribed and dated 1658, is in the collection of the Rijksmuseum. Amsterdam.

A special section of the sale is devoted to property from the collection of acclaimed makeup artist Pablo Manzoni. During an extraordinary career spanning more than 50 years, he worked with many of the world's best-dressed women, including the Duchess of Windsor, Maria Callas, Babe Paley and Jacqueline Onassis. His clients included not only aristocrats of the "Dolce Vita" era, but also increasingly the fashion industry, Italian including designers Princess Irene Galitzine, Roberto Capucci, Federico Forquet and Valentino. In 1965, Manzoni received

In 1965, Manzoni received the Coty Award for "having brought back makeup into the fashion spotlight," becoming the only cosmetician ever to be so honored. The Collection of Pablo Manzoni comprises almost 50 lots in the sale. Featured are Old Master paintings, English and Continental furniture, Chinese export porcelain, silver and rugs from his Park Avenue home.


Soda Dispensers, Coca-Cola Items To Lead Morphy's Sale Jan. 17–18

DENVER, PENN. — Country stores and old-time soda shops may be a thing of the past on Main Street America, but they are being replicated, and in great detail, in the homes of collectors from coast to coast. Antique advertising signs, syrup dispensers, Coca-Cola calendars and promotional items, tins and early beverage bottles are more popular than ever, with a demand that outstrips supply when it comes to rare and perfect examples.

Morphy Auctions' gallery is always a hive of activity before and during its antique advertising sales, and that is expected to be the case when Morphy's hosts its January 17–18 specialty sale.

Within the 1,700-lot offering are many ceramic and metal syrup dispensers of the type used in soda fountains in the late Nineteenth-early Twentieth Centuries. Standouts include a rare variation of Fowler's Cherry Smash dispenser, with a colorful logo of three cherries and a leafy branch and "5 Cents" (\$2/2,500) and a 1918 Howell's Orange Julep dispenser in a vibrant orange hue (\$1,5/3,000).

Coca-Cola collectors will find more than 800 lots of advertising items issued by the Atlanta bottling company. A highlight is a rare 1901 Coke calendar in an ornate gilt frame, presented in a shadowbox. The calendar origi-

nated from the City Drug Store in Myersdale, Penn., and retains the original drugstore sticker (\$10/18,000).

A fine example of a 1930s Coca-Cola bottle-shape radio will be offered. "It would be hard to improve on the condition of this radio. It's a real beauty," said Dan Morphy, president of Morphy Auctions. The 23¹/₂-inch could Coke radio reach \$3,5/5,500.

Many other soft drink brands are represented in the sale some familiar and others more obscure. An example of artistry and rich coloration is a circa 1930s embossed tin sign for Whistle soda. "Thirsty? Just Whistle" the sign suggests, adding, "Demand the Genuine" and "No Preservatives." The 28½-by-20¼-inch sign is estimated at \$800-\$1,400.

A 1907-1914 cardboard cutout (\$1/2,000) depicts Moxie's marketing and advertising guru Frank Archer seated on a crate of Moxie. The sign is preserved under glass in a shadowbox, and in terms of condition, Morphy says: "A better example may not exist."

An oval tin "Say Hires" sign with the company's pointing-boy mascot holding a foaming mug of root beer dates to around 1907.

Measuring 24 inches tall, it has choice graphics (\$3/6,000).

Another classic American soft drink is Orange Crush, which is advertised in a 1938 embossed tin sign with an image of a ridged, 1920 patent-date bottle. Highly detailed, the hard-to-find sign is54inches tall (\$800-\$1,500).

A selection of more than 300 tobacco-related lots is included in the sale. A highlight is a cut plug tobacco flat pocket tin from Larus & Bro., Richmond, Va. A rare tin featuring an image of a glamorous woman in eveningwear, it isestimated at \$1.4/1.800.

"There should be hands raised all over the room for lot 1720," said Morphy, describing a Mail Pouch ribbon cut chewing tobacco radio. "It's the only example we've ever seen, so we know it's extremely rare." Its knobs are still present, and the depiction of the tobacco product on its facade is fine (\$3/5,000).

Then auction will start at 9 am on both days. Preview will be daily from 9 am to 4 pm or from 8 to 9 am on auction day. Morphy Auctions is at 2000 North Reading Road.

Gold & Silver Coins Will Ring The Register At Stephenson's

SOUTHAMPTON, PENN. -Precious metals have long been viewed as a safe harbor for investors who are riding out stock market dips. For many, the preferred way to establish a private metals-based hedge fund has been to purchase gold, silver and other rare coins at auction. Stephenson's January 23 coin auction beginning at 10 am includes a variety of options for collectors' consideration, from an American Eagle \$5 gold coin to uncirculated silver dollars and proof sets.

The core of the sale consists of two estate collections, one of which was sourced through a financial adviser in the Mid-Atlantic region. Auctioneer, ISAaccredited appraiser and Numismatic Guaranty Corporation member Tom Wakeley selected several auction lots for special mention. One of them is a pair of 2¹/₂-ounce Marian Anderson gold medallions by American Arts. Another comprises 10 uncirculated sterling silver Panamanian 20-Balboa coins struck by the Franklin Mint. Also noteworthy, Wakeley said, is the selection of US Morgan and Peace silver dollars interspersed throughout the sale, with a couple of featured lots

expected to draw the highest bids. "Those six Morgan silver dollars are from the Carson City [Nev.] Mint, which makes them very desirable to collectors," Wakeley said. Each comes with a numbered certificate from the mint.

Foreign proof sets will cross the auction block, including silver sets privately issued by United States Commemorative Gallery. Among the nations represented in the coinage are Panama, Trinidad and Jamaica.

Lots 72 through 86 consist of United States proof sets from the 1950s, a decade favored by collectors. In addition, there are US 1-ounce Silver Eagles, a 1990 American Eagle \$5 gold coin and many Mercury dimes, Walking Liberty half dollars and large cents. Also to be offered are two sealed US Mint bags of uncirculated 1963P Jefferson nickels (\$200 face value) and 1963 Lincoln pennies (\$50 face value), respectively.

ly enough, is that this inquiry has been buoyed these many decades by Hirschl & Adler's sustained commitment to presenting, through impeccably designed exhibitions and catalogs, the very best of American Neoclassical art and design. Our steadily deepening appreciation for the period's arts is in no small part thanks to their efforts.

"This is Hirschl & Adler's

sixth Neoclassical exhibition," Liz Feld told us on a recent tour of the sprawling show. In 1999, the firm focused on Boston design. In 2011, it turned to New York and Duncan Phyfe. More broadly focused, the current display emphasizes new discoveries and documented examples from many places, all the best of the best.

The phrase "very rich and

handsome," written in 1820 by Abby Breese Salisbury to describe a group of furniture that she commissioned from the Boston cabinetmaking firm Isaac Vose & Son, alludes to the era's restrained opulence. By invoking Isaac Vose & Son, the Felds also acknowledge some of the most exciting new research currently underway by independent scholars Robert Mussey and Clark Pearce.

Selected as the show's cover image, an 1842 cut-paper and pencil silhouette by Augustin Edouart illustrates just how handsome a time it was. It takes as its subject the Daniel Pinckney Parker family and shows in detail the refinement of their residence at 40 Beacon Street in Boston's fashionable Beacon Hill. As the Felds note, the Parkers lived in a house designed by architect Alexander Parris (1780-1861), next door to a rowhouse built for Nathan Appleton (1779–1861) and near David and Miriam Sears, whose 42 Beacon Street residence is now the Somerset Club. These names conjure some of the most important commissions of the age.

Rather than organize the works chronologically or by medium, Hirschl & Adler offers domestically scaled vignettes incorporating furniture, mirrors, clocks, lighting, silver, ceramics, glass and fine arts produced between 1810 and the 1840s in the major style centers of Boston, New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore, plus occasional outliers like Portsmouth, N.H.

The catalog's first entry is a

that descended in the Livingston family. It for many years was on loan to the Metropolitan Museum of Art and is considered the work of Duncan Phyfe. Also attributed to Phyfe is a monumental bookcase thought to be the largest and finest example of its form known. Peter Kenny, the newly named co-president of the Classical American Homes Preservation Trust, discovered bills confirming that Phyfe made a set of 16 gondole chairs represented in the show for Stephen Van Rensselaer IV. Fashioned from contrasting rosewood and satinwood with ebonized detail, and inlaid with the finest die-stamped brass, a circa 1820 Philadelphia secrétaire à abattant is probably the work of Joseph B. Barry, who is also credited with a pair of socalled "eliptic" bureaus carved with Egyptian figures. A suite of Philadelphia furniture in bright curly maple and fancy painted furniture from Portsmouth and Baltimore are novelties in a presentation dominated by lustrous mahogany. Notable mirrors include a pair of New York carved and gilded girandole examples probably made by Isaac Platt between 1815 and 1818. Two French ormolu mantel clocks honor George Washing-

circa 1815 rosewood wine cooler with dolphin toe caps and lion's head handles. It is attributed to Thomas Seymour. The Boston cabinetmaker is also thought to have supervised the creation of a sumptuous linen press, likely made about 1825 by Emmons & Archbald or Isaac Vose & Son.

Seymour served as foreman of Isaac Vose & Son when the vivacious sofa that Feld and Feld occupy here was made around 1820. Likely one from Abby Salisbury's "rich and handsome" suite, it is carved with eagles, possibly by the craftsman Thomas Wightman. Three circa 1818–22 marbletopped pier tables, two of which are a pair, are attributed to Emmons & Archbald, as may be a secrétaire à abattant of about 1820–25.

From New York comes a diminutive lady's secretary

ton. Subtly different, both were made about 1815–1817 and most likely have mechanisms by Dubuc and cases by Rabiat. Long a Hirschl & Adler specialty, appropriate period lighting ranges from a labeled pair of tole wall lamps by William Carleton and a Henry N. Hooper student lamp, both makers from Boston, to a spectacular pair of English double Argand lamps, circa 1827–47, retailed by Baldwin Gardiner of New York.

Shown to cool perfection, silver includes a show-stealing monumental ewer made by Thomas Fletcher of Philadelphia after 1827. Also represented are Sidney Gardiner, Anthony Rasch & Co., Edward Lownes and Harvey Lewis, all of Philadelphia, plus Baldwin Gardiner and William Thomson of New York. Boston, note the Felds, produced little important silver in the Neoclassical taste.

A few pieces of Tucker porcelain, French "Old Paris" urns decorated with American "worthies" Thomas Jefferson and James Monroe, and Chinese porcelain for the American market round out the ceramics. On loan from a private collection is a Bakewell, Page & Bakewell of Pittsburgh glass rinser from Andrew Jackson's White House service.

Some notable pieces sold before they could be included. To the Metropolitan Museum of Art went a Boston or Salem pier mirror with a painted panel memorializing American Revolutionary War heroes. A private collector claimed a monumental cylinder secretary that is probably from the shop of Duncan Phyfe. "It drives me crazy when people say that 'brown furniture' is dead," fumed Liz Feld. "The market for the best Neoclassical furniture is robust. Museums are delving into this era and acquiring important pieces to tell the story. We work also with private collectors who are interested in the material."

Containing a preface, introduction, 97 illustrated entries and a detailed bibliography, the catalog to the show sells for \$45 in the gallery or for \$52 post paid.

Westchester Glass Club Lecture Feb. 2 Will Survey Dorflinger Factory, Glass

DOBBS FERRY, N.Y. — Jim Asselstine, owner and director of the Dorflinger Factory Museum, will give a talk at the Westchester Glass Club meeting on Monday, February 2, "Restoring the Dorflinger Factory and Creating a New Museum in White Mills, PA" at the Aldersgate United Methodist Church at 1:30 pm, following a 1 pm social and glass study period. All are welcome to attend both events.

Asselstine will review the history of the Dorflinger glass companies in Brooklyn, N.Y., and White Mills, Penn., and the restoration of the Dorflinger Factory Office Building and Cutting Shop in White Mills, which form the new Dorflinger Factory Museum, highlighting items from the museum's permanent collection. Finally, he will summarize the 2015 events celebrating the 150th anniversary of the founding of the Dorflinger factory.

Dorflinger glass, the product of glassmaker Christian Dorflinger, was first produced in 1852 and continued to the 1860s in Brooklyn, where Greenpoint Glassworks Works is well known for providing the 1861 Lincoln White House with a cut and engraved glass service. Due to health and possibly economic problems, Christian moved his glassmaking operations to White Mills, Penn.,

around 1868, where he and his sons continued to make awardwinning cut, engraved and etched glass until closing in 1921.

Asselstine retired last year as managing director of Barclays Capital Inc to pursue his goal of purchasing and developing the Dorflinger Factory Museum. He has long been an avid collector of early American glass and Dorflinger glass in particular. He has served for many years as a trustee of the Dorflinger-Suydam Wildlife Sanctuary and Dorflinger Glass Museum, and has recently been elected as a museum fellow of the Corning Museum of Glass.

'Self: Portraits Of Artists In Their Absence' Goes Up January 29 At National Academy

NEW YORK CITY — The will be an opening reception on Wednesday, January 28, 6 to 8 pm, as the National Academy presents "Self: Portraits of Artists in Their Absence." On view January 29–May 3, the exhibition is an exploration of the relationship artists have with their own image and how prevailing cultural norms have influenced and transformed the conventions of self-representation over time.

The exhibition calls on the academy's collection of artist portraits, including self-portraits by Asher B. Durand, Thomas Eakins, Cecilia Beaux, George Grosz, Will Barnet, Andrew Wyeth, Jacob Lawrence, Wayne Thiebaud, Robert Rauschenberg and Howardena Pindell, among others, as well as works on loan by such artists as Umberto Boccioni, Marcel Duchamp, Meret Oppenheim, Piero Manzoni, Shirin Neshat and Ai Weiwei, among others.


A section of the exhibition will include self-portrait works on paper submitted

through an open call by artists 35 years or under working in the United States, selected by the curators Maurizio Pellegrin, Filippo Fossati and Diana Thompson. In addition, a photo booth station will allow visitors to snap their own selfportraits to contribute as part of the show.

Self-portraits are part of a longstanding artistic tradition, with some of the first known examples dating as far back as the Fourteenth Century. Self-portraiture gained particular interest and attention during the Middle Ages before flourishing as a widely popular genre during the Renaissance and has continued to change in style, content and approach ever since.

While self-portraits in the Nineteenth Century favored formal poses and would commonly be devoid of the familiar trappings of an artist, self-portraits from the Gilded Age and early Twentieth Century reflect greater freedom of form and a growing interest in the psyche and inner life of the artist. With an increasing tendency toward informality, artists began to show themselves at work, often in a studio space surrounded by their tools and materials. The emergence of new artistic techniques and technologies has also impacted the diversity of self-portraits over time, particularly with the advent of photography and video.

The self-portrait is not only an opportunity to observe and study one's outward appearance, but an occasion to confront one's inner thoughts, personal identity and emotions as well. For many artists, it can also be a deeply cathartic experience. The exhibition offers a unique glimpse into the process of self-representation and presents a progression of artistic conventions in every medium, including painting, drawing, photography, sculpture and video. In addition to tracing an historical overview of self-portraits over the last two centuries, the exhibition also shows how in today's age of compulsive self-celebration, the contemporary selfportrait provides another distinct inter-



From The Donald P. Dow Collection Of Lincolniana— Abraham Lincoln Civil War Letter At January 24 Heritage Auction

DALLAS, TEXAS — A rare letter fragment written by President Abraham Lincoln in 1862 to Baltimore attorney and politician Reverdy Johnson, containing a rare admission that the US Civil War was looking bad for the Union cause, is expected to bring \$25,000 or more as part of Her-itage Auctions' January 24 presentation of The Donald P. Dow Collection of Lincolniana. The Dow collection is an extraordinary grouping of some 302 lots of manuscripts and memorabilia, particularly devoted to Lincoln's April 15, 1865, assassination, which marks its 150th anniversary this year.

"Mr Dow was a meticulous collector who obtained many of his pieces 20–30 years ago, and this auction marks the first time in a generation that collectors have seen these items," said Tom Slater, director of Americana auctions at Heritage. "Considering Mr Dow's effort to document the assassination and the nation's reaction, it's fitting the collection is offered during its sesquicentennial year."

When Lincoln wrote the letter to Johnson on July 26, 1862, the nation was deep in the throes of the Civil War. In the letter — of which only a fragment survives — Lincoln deflects concerns the government would emancipate and arm former slaves for the Union effort. "I never had a wish to touch the foundation of their society, or any right of theirs," Lincoln wrote. "I am a patient man — always willing to forgive on the Christian terms of repentance; and also to give ample time for repentance. Still I must save this government if possible. What I cannot do, of course I will not do; but it may as well be understood, once and for all,

that I shall not surrender this game, leaving any available card unplayed. Yours truly A. Lincoln."

"The letter indicates Lincoln was open to any and all options, including emancipation and the arming of slaves, if it was deemed necessary to restore the Union," Slater said. Another important highlight is a letter and presidential endorsement written on behalf of a Union prisoner at Libby Prison in Richmond, Va., who was on the verge of being executed by Confederates. A prisoner swap was arranged that involved the son of Confederate General Robert E. Lee, then a prisoner of war in Union custody. Lincoln authorized the exchange, saving the soldier's life, adding some directives to his endorsement.

The collection also holds an unprecedented number of autographs by Lincoln assassin and stage actor John

Wilkes Booth. In an autographed letter signed by Booth on October 9, 1861, Booth describes his plans to perform in Boston and in Buffalo, N.Y. The collection also contains Booth's military arrest warrant and the original diary James Rowan kept by O'Beirne, a Washington, DC, provost marshal active in the hunt. The memorandum meticulously records his investigation, interviews, leads, directives to operatives as well as his final report summarizing the actions he took that led to Booth's capture, which entitled him to a share in the reward money.

Among a trove of important documents are probably the two most extensive eyewitness accounts to the assassination itself, as well as rare signed letters of Presidential Theater Box occupants Clara Harris and Henry Rathbone.

Rounding out the highlights

are signatures of both Lincoln and Mary Todd Lincoln on the same sheet of paper dated "Jany 6th 1864"; a framed presentation display featuring photographs and autographs from Lincoln, Booth and Boston Corbett, the soldier who shot and killed Booth; and a lock of Lincoln's hair that was removed from the president's head by Surgeon General Joseph K. Barnes at the Peterson House, shortly after he was shot.

MORRISTOWN, N.J. — Before radio, TV or the Internet, there was political cartoonist Thomas Nast (1840–1902), one of the most recognized names in the world of political cartoons. Nast illustrated Civil War battles, Union and Confederate troop movements, and their activities throughout war. He also captured the poignancy of

Often called the father of American political cartooning, Nast's images remain popular today. His well-known depictions of the Democratic donkey and Republican elephant, conceived more than 100 years ago, continue to represent both parties. 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those back home, who worried about their family members in combat.

"The Civil War through the Eyes of Thomas Nast" is on view at Macculloch Hall Historical Museum through August 31.

Nast covered both the home and battle fronts; his work was the main source of information about the war for many people. His illustrations in publications like Harper's Weekly brought the information about what was happening into the homes of the American public, the way mass media does today. Like all media agents, he not only depicted what was happening by reporting on the events taking place, but also created propaganda by trying to stir emotions and support for the Union side.

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James Henry Pepper Named New Executive Director, Gilcrease Museum

TULSA, OKLA. — The University of Tulsa announces that James Pepper Henry has been named as the new executive director of Gilcrease Museum. Pepper Henry comes to Gilcrease Museum from the Heard Museum in Phoenix where he has served as director and CEO since 2013. At his direction, the Heard developed "Build!: Toy Brick Art," which was the most successful summer exhibit in the museum's history, increasing museum attendance by 58 percent, and memberships by 150 percent.

As an associate director of the NMAI for nearly ten years, Pepper Henry managed a wide variety of American Indian community-oriented programs, services and traveling exhibitions. He played a pivotal role in the establishment and launch of NMAI, on the National Mall in Washington, DC, which opened to the public in 2004.

Pepper Henry served as the founding director of the Kanza Museum in Kaw City, Okla.; interim curator of American Indian art at the Portland Art Museum; gallery director at the Interstate Firehouse Cultural Center in Portland, Ore.; and gallery director for the Institute of Alaska Native Arts in Fairbanks, Alaska.

Pepper Henry is an enrolled member of the Kaw Nation, and affiliated with the Muscogee Creek nation. His mother is of Kaw and Muscogee Creek descent. He was the first enrolled American Indian to lead the Heard in its 85-year history. 

bertville, N.J. Provenance of the work was fully documented from the time the work left the estate of the artist to the time it entered the present collection from which it was offered in 1981. The piece was further complimented by its original Ben Badura carved frame.

Several works by Walter E. Baum (Pennsylvania, 1884–1956) did well, including a large oil on canvas, "The Red Mill," 1935, which realized \$32,175 and "Winter Brook," a smaller example which went well above estimate at \$16,800. "Winter Brook" came from a private Bucks County collection and was being sold to help fund the higher education of the family's daughter in a nice alternative to the traditional 529 college funding options.

The Group Exhibition 'Reconfigured' On View At Margaret Thatcher Projects

NEW YORK CITY — Margaret Thatcher Projects is presenting "Reconfigured," a group exhibition of artworks by Jaq Belcher, Adam Fowler, Meg Hitchcock and Nan Swid through February 7. Featuring works on paper, the exhibition focuses on the style in which these artists morph their common material to translate it into their own visual language.

Jaq Belcher cuts into the paper, manipulating light and shadow organized into patterns that evoke natural phenomena in shape and form. The cuts made to create her repeated forms, and the time it took to make them, are then carefully notated along the bottom of each drawing. The focus on reduction and repetition require a focused stillness.

Uniting aspects of drawing,

collage and sculpture in his process, Adam Fowler starts with sweeping graphite drawings on lightweight paper. Fowler cuts away the negative spaces from his drawings with an X-acto knife, carefully stacking the resulting lace-thin sheets to complete his work. Completed works range from two to upwards of 80 layers. Exploring subtleties in surface and shade within the structure of his drawing space, Fowler's calligraphic gestures simultaneously explore the boundaries of minimalism, drawing and abstract expressionism.

Meg Hitchcock, inspired by the loaded nature of spiritual texts, and her own lifelong relationship with spirituality, cuts her material from sacred texts such as the Bible, the Torah or the Bhagavad Gita. The small pieces of cut paper are then used to form passages from other holy books, often composed as a mandala to express unity and completion.

Nan Swid, too, uses paper laden with history, carefully selecting antique books and ledgers for the tactile quality of their worn surfaces, laden with mystery in respect to their past usages. Swid breathes new life into her weatherworn materials, allowing for an open methodology as she deconstructs and rearranges, eloquently combining her objects into compositions that exude a controlled serenity despite exposed cracks and fissures.

A graphic designer by training, Ganzeer's name (bicycle chain in English) reflects his firm belief that artists should be agents for change and his work in Egypt along with exhibitions across the globe clearly reflect this. He has proven adept at mastering a number of techniques in his ongoing effort to explain the places and people where he has lived.

Ganzeer is the pseudonym of an Egyptian artist. He is not an author, comic book artist, installation artist, painter, speaker, street artist or videographer, though he has assumed these roles in a number of places around the world. His art has been shown in Bahrain, Belgium, Brazil, Canada, Finland, Germany, Jordan, the Netherlands, Switzerland, United Arab Emirates and the United States, as well as in myriad Cairo galleries. Palmer says donations and grants totaling \$25,000 paid for the caboose.



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Feeding Frenzy Finishes Off Year As Rock Island Nets \$47.5 Million







ROCK ISLAND, ILL. - Rock Island Auction Company's premiere firearms auction December 5-7 proved exciting and successful. Given the choice collector firearms and several accomplished collections represented in the sale, it seemed fitting that the auction followed in the shadow of Black Friday shopping as this was a highly competitive and fast-paced affair.

At the end of the three days, the auction achieved \$11.4 million in

than doubling high estimates, including the gold plated, factory engraved third generation single action example at \$13,800, or the J.P. Lower & Sons shipped black powder Colt single action for \$6.900.

Day two would prove to be a bustling auction day from start to finish. Beginning with a host of Winchesters, Volcanics and Henrys, strong bids were leveled immediately at firearms like a deluxe special order Winchester Third Model 1873 lever action with brilliant case hardening that fetched \$149,500. A factory engraved New Haven Arms Volcanic No. 1 pocket pistol also received the attention it deserved by rocketing past high estimate to hit \$25,875. Likewise, a prewar factory engraved Colt single-action Army revolver with carved pearl grips breeched high estimate to score \$51,750. Other highlights from Saturday: the historic "C Compa-Colt Walker reached nv" \$172,500, a previously undiscovered deluxe, panel scene engraved Colt Model 1855 revolving shotgun achieved \$138,000 and the Civil War production Henry rifle brought \$86,250. The end of Saturday was quite a surprise to everyone in attendance. As Colt "Snake Guns" began to cross the block, the auction hall began to buzz. Every phone line was filled and online



sales, bringing the company's annual total to \$47.5 million, making it another banner year at Rock Island Auction Company.

The first day set the trend for the weekend's bidding battles as collectors aggressively sought their favorites in several categories. Among high-end Ithaca shotguns, single barrels and side by sides could not be had quickly enough, like the engraved, gold and silver inlaid 7E grade single barrel that fetched \$8,050, or the scarce field grade ejector hammerless side-by-side 28-gauge for \$6.325.

Also making a splash was the Charter Arms revolver used in the assassination attempt of Governor George Wallace at \$28,750 and a custom engraved Civil War Colt 1860 Army with a factory letter detailing its original shipment to the New York Arsenal, \$19,550. Other Colts also sold well Friday, often more revolver with carved pearl grips breeched its high estimate to make \$51,750.

The success of double actions initially featured Colt Model 1877-78 Lightnings and Thunderers, led by the William Baird collection. Standouts included a rare Lightning chambered in .32 Colt that soared over estimate to \$25,875, while a Colt Model 1877 Target chambered in .32 Smith & Wesson (\$12/18,000) was driven by determined bidders to \$31.625.

Much like the first day of the auction, high-end sporting shotguns continued to be a soughtafter commodity. Handily besting their estimates were an antique Parker Brothers under lifter

1793 Chain Cent Brings Record \$2.35 Million At Heritage Sale

ORLANDO, FLA. — A pristine condition, early American one-cent denomination coin dated 1793 was sold for a world's record price of \$2.35 million, including the buyer's premium, by Heritage Auctions at the Florida United Numismatics (FUN) convention auction on Wednesday, January 7.

"This copper cent is about as large as a modern quarter-dollar. It is quite rare because the controversial design on the back was quickly changed soon after production of the coins was started in March 1793 at the Philadelphia mint," Greg Rohan, president of Heritage Auctions said.

"It's called a 'Chain Cent,' because the tail's side design prominently shows a chain with 13 linking rings to symbolize the unity of the original 13 colonies. However, critics at the time claimed it evoked an image of slavery, so the design was quickly changed with a wreath replacing the chain," said Rohan.

"Bidding for the 1793 Chain Cent opened at \$1, and the winning bid of \$2.35 million is a world's record for any penny. There were gasps and then applause from the more than 100 people attending the auction when the bidding ended. The buyer was not present, though. He's a longtime, avid coin collector who wants to remain anonymous, and he placed his bid online," Rohan said.

New Weekly Market 1stNLine.com To Offer Fresh Goods Without The Frills

HOLLISTON, MASS. — "People want to find something that is fresh, interesting and under the money," Mario Pollo told us when he stopped by our offices one recent appointment-filled morning. It was a day like many others for the Holliston, Mass., trader, an active show dealer who maintains neither a shop nor, until now, a website.

At noon Eastern Standard Time on Tuesday, February 17, Pollo and 11 similarly enterprising colleagues will launch www.1stNLine.com, a virtual weekly market of fresh-picked goods. By harnessing technology, the sellers hope to reach new buyers and recover old ones who may have drifted away from traditional brick-and-mortar antiques shows.

"1stNLine.com is completely different from existing selling platforms such as eBay, Ruby Lane or 1stDibs," says Pollo, 1stNLine's president. Each Tuesday, promptly at noon, the dozen dealers will collectively post up to 60 freshly sourced antiques and works of art. Other features, such as early buying, available by subscription only, may be added over time.

"1stNLine.com is just like going to a show. Everything is priced to sell, from a few hundred dollars to a few thousand or more," explains Pollo, who has a wellpracticed eye for intriguing, original pieces.

All of the group's members sell

to a mix of wholesale and retail customers. Besides Pollo, they are Steve and Judy Ball of Shawnee Mission, Kan.; Tom Delach of Columbus, Ohio; Sandy Jacobs of Swampscott, Mass.; Ian McKelvey of South Windham, Conn.; Paul Smith of Harlan, Iowa; Steve Smoot of Lancaster, Penn.; Douglas L. Solliday of Columbia, Mo.; Joshua Steenburgh of Pike, N.H.; Paul Thien and Douglas Warriner of Firehouse Antiques, Galena, Md.; Bill Quinn of Alna, Maine; and Douglas R. Wyant of Cassopolis, Mich.

About six months ago, the colleagues began discussing ways to bolster sales. They sought to represent a range of collecting specialties and to cover a broad swath of the country, from northern New England to the Midwestern heartland and the upper South. While all are known for Americana, individual members also have expertise in fine arts, Native American art, jewelry, advertising art, architectural artifacts, gadgetry, and cottage and camp antiques.

"We're keeping it simple. The aim is to bring fresh merchandise to the marketplace on a weekly basis. Many websites become online museums because they are not refreshed or maintained," says Steve Smoot. The organization's treasurer notes, "From both the buying and the selling side, this is very dealeroriented site. Each participant is setting his own terms and meth-

HONOLULU, HAWAII — January 5 marked a milestone for the Honolulu Museum of Art. when Healoha Johnston joined the museum as assistant curator of the arts of Hawaii. It is the first time the museum has had a position devoted to this collection, which spans from pre-contact to the 1970s.

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Enthusiastic Buyers Head To Garth's For Holiday Shopping

DELAWARE, OHIO — Garth's Auctioneers and Appraisers sold the well-known collection of Dorothy Massey from Tulsa, Okla., December 4. Massey's 40year collection drew buyers from the East Coast and across the Midwest.

Amelia Jeffers, president of Garth's, noted as she was stepping off the block, "The high prices revealed today on the Massey's collection prove once again that there is no better place to sell Americana than right here in the Midwest; being centrally located allows private collectors and dealers from across the Midwest to be here and the location provides easy accessibility for those that have traveled down from the East Coast as well, resulting in the great prices you are seeing here today."

All bidders' eyes were on Massey's prized stumpwork jewelry cask. Dating to the Seventeenth-early Eighteenth Century and depicting a courting couple, it sold for eight times over high estimate at \$8,700. A carved bible box also sailed past its \$250/500 estimate at \$5,040. An American wallpaper bandbox from the late 1830s that depicted the balloon flight of Cincinnati silversmith Richard Clayton in 1835 quadrupled its high estimate to bring \$5,750.

mate to bring \$5,750. Two early Hepplewhite beds sent paddles flying over estimates: an early Nineteenth Century campaign bed (\$250/500) with a shaped headboard fetched \$5,400 and a tester bed saw heated bidding, \$5,640. An Eighteenth Century, New England pine mule chest with old red paint brought \$7,560, more than tripling high estimate. Additional highlights included an early ladder back armchair and side chair for \$1,080, while another early armchair brought \$3,840

against an estimate of \$250/400. Massey's colorful textiles caught the eyes of bidders as well. An Eighteenth Century lady's crewelwork pocket with a wool embroidered heart, surrounded by floral vines and lined with homespun blue and white ticking, brought \$1,320. Three lots of whole cloth quilts sold in succession. The first in olive green with hand quilted vertical rows of stylized plumes took \$1,375, an indigo blue with a chevron design and ribbed borders brought \$1,560, while the third featured hand quilted blocks with a pumpkin seed design and went out at \$2,280.

An additional group of Nineteenth-Twentieth Century textiles and pillows, including seat cushions, pillows made from Oriental rugs and crewelwork, a pillow cover, a needlework table runner, and a small set of pockets or saddlebags fetched \$1,920 against a presale estimate of \$100/300. Additional highlights of the Massey collection included a portrait of a woman attributed to the Prior-Hamblin School that earned \$8,700. A Nineteenth Century folksy trade sign in the form of a large percussion rifle brought \$3,360.

Garth's fine and vintage jewelry auction took place the next evening and offered many gift givers the opportunity to put something dazzling under the holiday tree. Selling for \$6,300 was a Rolex silver triangular Masonic pocket watch with a sapphire set triangular open face and mother-of-pearl dial. A pair of two carats total weight diamond stud earrings brought \$4,920, while a traditional-style platinum bridal set with a round brilliant cut diamond fetched

At Bonhams, Furniture & Decorative Arts Auction Achieves More Than \$3.3 Million

LOS ANGELES, CALIF. — Bonhams' auction of European furniture and decorative arts, including the collection of William M. Keck II, achieved more than \$3.3 million and was more than 90 percent sold by value on December 8 and 9. The 788-lot sale saw strong bidding all around in the auction room, online and over the phones, with participants from

California head offices, offered without reserve. Highlights included a mid-Eighteenth Century Italian rococo chinoiserie decorated chest that sold for \$92,500; a Nineteenth Century English mahogany concentric extension dining table that brought \$81,250; a set of four, mid-Eighteenth Century George II carved walnut armchairs that took in \$52,500; a Chimid-Eighteenth Century Italian rococo carved giltwood mirrors that realized \$20,000.

The pair flew far past its \$50/70,000 estimate to bring \$131,000. Guillemin is best known for his Orientalist works that were inspired by the Middle East and its exoticism. Also notable from the Warner Bros. Studio Collection was a pair of French gilt-bronze mounted and Vernis Martin decorated mahogany vitrines, circa 1900, which achieved \$37,500.

On offer from famed *Casablanca* director Michael Curtiz was a circa 1900 Louis XV-style gilt-bronze mounted marquetry and parquetry inlaid kingwood table de milieu by François Linke that achieved \$27,500.

Continental Art Leads Diverse Sale At Fairfield Auction

Auction Action In Monroe, Conn.

MONROE, CONN. - Fairfield Auction concluded the 2014 season with a diverse sale on November 16. The sale featured strong results across categories, especially among items with an international market. The sale also included more than 75 works by Navajo artist R.C. Gorman from the estate of Gorman's gallery director.

The top lot of the day was a Florentine marble frieze depicting the Madonna and Child, which attracted several international bidders. With eight phone bidders at the ready, it opened at \$4,000 and quickly soared above estimate before finally selling at \$66,000 to the London trade. It was found on a routine house call tucked away under a piece of furniture in an old Fairfield County home.

Estate jewelry provided much of the excitement for the day, with many buyers on the floor and most lots exceeding high estimate. A 3.4-carat diamond solitaire ring realized \$30,000, a pair of Tiffany platinum and diamond earrings brought \$3,840, a Rolex lady's 18K gold presidential wristwatch earned \$4,080, and a ruby and diamond bracelet did well at \$2,880. Another ring, with a 2.5-carat diamond center stone, performed well at \$14,400.

A bronze by Franz von Stuck titled "Monna Vanna" also attracted serious international bidders, and set an auction record for the form, selling at \$43,200 against an estimate of \$20/30,000.

Other fine art that performed well included an Eric Sloane oil, "Taos Church," that brought \$7,800 and a still life by Nikolaus Gyzis that went within estimate at \$13,200. A

Harry was a great friend ever since the first evening Helen and I met him at a small auction somewhere in Pennsylvania. He outbid me for a bird tree. Before we said goodnight in the parking lot, we had made our first of many purchases from Harry, that bird tree. Best of all, we met a man who helped us focus on our collecting, shared his knowledge with us and was never without a smile and an especially warm welcome. It was a very sad day when we, the world of antiques, lost Harry Hartman for he was truly a pillar in the business for a great many years and was, indeed, the friendly-kindly man.

I knew Harry for about 40 years. I can honestly say that I never met anyone who didn't love him. Back when, he was great friends with the artist and antiques dealer David Ellinger. I think they got kicked out of Bucks County for having too much fun! Harry always loved Pennsylvania German decorative arts and bought the very best. He was the man, as far back as I can remember, at the center of it all, getting into houses and finding stuff way back in the 1950s. His clients trusted him, stayed with him, and asked him to do everything for them. He'd jet off to Palm Beach to arrange flowers.

Harry was a heavyweight at auction. Once a lady, having outbid him on a chalkware cat, approached him for advice on how to care for the piece. He told her, "I'd run a hot bath and soak it overnight." Knowing Harry, I'm not surprised! Last April, he bought a circa 1780 Lancaster County painted schrank at Pook & Pook for \$102,000. He told me that he sold it 40 years ago and wanted it back. He got it.


Harry was an important influence on us when we started out. His shop on the canal in New Hope, Penn., was amazing and only an hour away from where we lived at the time. 

Harry was an old-school dealer who combined an innate, natural eye for what was beautiful with an understanding of why it was significant and of good quality. with his wonderful sense of style. He was a fount of knowledge — about antiques, design, color, texture and architecture. He was versatile. We worked with him on a second, completely different project a great Art Deco house in a tropical setting. He had an unparalleled capacity for work. He loved what he did and it was there in the results. He worked on the best projects, from Maine to Florida, but at heart was a simple man who loved his family and his garden.

"Harry had a wicked sense of humor. We had so much fun. He introduced us to the wonderful world of collecting, not only the objects but the individuals. His unique sense of style is everywhere in our home. I can't imagine having done this without him," Miller said.

Harry Hartman is survived by his twin brother, Robert, and many nieces and nephews. Like a father to Oliver Overlander, who was 18 when he met his mentor, Hartman embraced Overlander's wife, Judy, and their children. Robesonia, Penn., dealer Greg K. Kramer and his wife, Nancy, were practically family, too. Their son Eric is married to Oliver and Judy's daughter, Olivia.

At Hartman's request, no memorial service is planned. Contributions in his name may be made to the Lancaster City Police Foundation, care of Mounted Patrol Fund, PO Box 10171, Lancaster PA 17605-0171.

Hartman is certain to be remembered at New York's Winter Antiques Show, where Leslie Miller will speak and sign books on Friday, January 23, at 2:30 pm, and at the Original Semi-Annual York Antiques Show and Sale, January 30-February 1, where Harry B. Hartman had been scheduled to exhibit. Ed Hild of Olde Hope Antiques recalled that a York show was where he met Hartman in the late 1970s. It was also

In the course of writing Paint, Pattern & People: Furniture of Southeastern Pennsylvania, 1725-1850 with Wendy Cooper, I got to know Harry Hartman and through him met many of the collectors of painted chests, fraktur and redware with whom he had worked. Harry was an absolute stalwart at the York Antiques Show and I often visited with him there. He was generous with information and could usually remember what farm sale a piece came out of decades ago. He had a great eye. He appreciated individual objects but also envisioned how they all went together to form a collection.

I met Harry back in the 1970s. He helped define a generation of antiques dealers beginning with his development of the "Marietta Look" and his work with the du Ponts. I think of homespun and tab curtains as his innovations. He continued to define American antiques dealing and collecting for 60 years. Doing all the major antiques shows and designing great homes and gardens, Harry never seemed to slow down. He worked with major collectors and dealers such as Bihler & Coger, Peter Tillou, Don Walters and other greats as he pursued his love of Windsor chairs, weathervanes, baskets, redware and great furniture. Harry, you are already missed but what an inspiration you were and are.

Harry is iconic, among the last of the old-guard Americana dealers on the forefront of turning Americana into a decorating style. He started out in Lumberville in Bucks County, just up the river from us in New Hope, Penn. We opened Olde Hope Antiques in 1976 and probably met him at the York shows. He was charming, with an incredible eye for the best. Anything Pennsylvania German he loved — painted furniture, textiles, carvings. All of it. His personal collection was vast. Every client he did a house for had baskets.

He had the kind of booth that you studied and was a tough contender at auction, but he was generous of spirit. If he liked you, admired your eye or merchandise, he mentored and supported you. As young dealers, there were days at the Delaware Antiques Show when our only sales were to Harry during set up. He'd bring clients into our booth and sell our things. He did it unhesitatingly.

Harry was associated with many prominent families over the years. Cliff and Jean Durell owned a farm in the Doylestown area and, as he did with so many of his clients, he later began working with other family members. Their son, Chip, bought the most beautiful property, a 1689 stone farmhouse called Burgess Lea just north of New Hope. Harry put it all together and it became his signature style.

The 1960s into the 1980s were heady times and Harry was at the forefront. It was lucky for us that, when we came into the field, we were able to ride the wave. We benefited from Harry's influence and from the clients whom he developed.

Harry was a legendary figure in country antiques and, in the area of Pennsylvania German art and accessories, was unsurpassed. Pat and I probably met him at one of our first shows, in York. The last time I saw him was at the York show on Halloween. He was sitting outside with Oliver, as he did at every show, taking a smoke break. Harry's house in Marietta was wonderful, decorated in Harry's style with everything he loved. He was a huge influence on us and was always so generous and enthusiastic. He brought clients onto the floor and made shows successful for many dealers. Years ago, Harry exhibited at all of the major shows. I hated to see him leave those shows one at a time.

Harry placed many wonderful things in great collections and showed his clients how to live with objects as their makers intended.

Years ago, the New York Times magazine did a story on the Winter Antiques Show. As I recall, Harry was pictured wearing a blue gingham shirt, sitting in front of a Dutch cupboard filled with redware. He advertised antiques from Pennsylvania's farmland and that described him exactly. Harry was a true Dutchman. He dressed like a Pennsylvania German. He ate like a Pennsylvania German. He dealt in the things that those people used in the Eighteenth and Nineteenth Centuries. It was his true love. You look at his approach to decorating. It was plain and simple, like he was, but tasteful and beyond perfection. His time was the 1950s through the 1980s, a golden age for dealers. Very few of his class remain.
